Course: DM-S613 - Traversing Life's Transitions

Date: May 16-20, 2016

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Course Description:

This course is intended to explore issues of life and major life transitions through the framework of pastoral care, grieving, discernment, crisis, worship and preaching and the lenses of each student and his/her communities (context). The focus will be on helping individuals and communities of faith in transitions, losses and decision-making by first looking at how we ourselves have traversed transitions in our own lives. Course goals will be accomplished through readings, film clips, lectures, case study presentations and role plays/reenactments.

Course Goals:

At the end of the course students will have:

- Gained an understanding of how they have handled their own life transitions
- Increased their understanding on helping others through transitions
- Learned a multi-faceted approach for ministering through transitions
- Applied their learning to a specific community of faith

Course Requirements:

- **1. Reading and Preparation for Class.** Participants are expected to prepare for class by reading and reflecting on the required readings for each session.
- **2. Attendance and active class participation**. Participants are expected to attend each class and to actively participate in class discussions, and to listen and respond respectfully to others.
- 3. Pre-Class Assignments. Participants are required to read all 5 books prior to class and to submit a journal reflection of each book before the first day of class. These will not be graded but will start us all off on common ground and the same foundation.

 In addition, each student is to prepare a case study (format and description sent with course outline and examples given in Karaban *Crisis Caring* book) to be presented in class. The case study should be a situation in which the student is the minister/counselor to an individual, group or community. The situation should involve one of the themes of the class—loss, discernment, crisis, or transition. (3-5 pages)

4. In-Class Assignments:

Each student will present his/her case in class in a chosen time slot on Wednesday or Thursday.

5. Post-Class Assignment (Due July 5, 2016)

Re-write and expand your case incorporating feedback from the class and the professor. Add some of the following elements:

Response to 5 questions (provided by professor)

Expanded section on Understanding the Situation in a Broader Context

Verbatim section with Analysis of Skills

Expanded Theological Reflection Section – add a Sermon, Prayers, Personal Psalm, Worship service, or Church Program

Evaluation:

- In-Class Presentation 30%
- Seminar Participation -20%
- Follow-up paper to In-Class Case Study Presentation 50%
