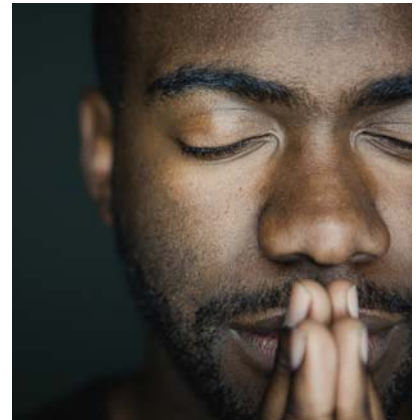


Public Engagement: Confronting and Healing Communal Brokenness and Despair

Living out the gospel message requires confronting brokenness and despair in the community. Jesus models for us a ministry of wholeness and bringing hope to those in pain. Congregations do not have to look very far to find issues ranging from economic disparities, addiction, and racial tensions plaguing their communities. The question is, “How best can congregations model Jesus’ ministry of wholeness?” It requires learning how to advocate prophetically while ministering to concrete needs facing individuals. Participants in this program will be better equipped to lead congregations in healing the brokenness experienced in communities while being beacons of hope.

Each Doctor of Ministry track consists of ten three-credit courses for a total of 30 credit hours. These include seven core courses, two electives and the Project Seminar which will prepare you to write your capstone project paper.

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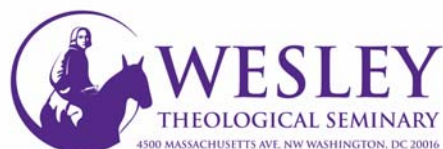
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
